Full Steam Ahead and Cider Sales go through the Medieval Roof! – 2 October 2016

October 2nd 06.00 hours Cromhall South Gloucestershire. James Buchan lifts the latch of his back door and walks through the cold autumnal morning air across the yard to his 1905 Burrel Steam Engine. Feels in his pocket for a lighter and ignites the diesel soaked rag he

prepared the previous evening, throws it into the back of the firebox and slams shut the door. OHD 2016 is underway.

Once again the South Gloucester saying of 'don't pack the shorts away until after Orchard Harvest Day!' was bang on!

This is the first time we have booked a steam

traction engine for this show and didn't it look at home chugging away there in the north lee of the barn wall. It would have been a familiar autumn site around farmyards from the turn of the last century through both WW years and into the late 40's when the stationery threshing machines it would have driven were replaced by the combine harvester.



UWE Jazz Band supplied us with the perfect music for a laid back Sunday afternoon and were no doubt warming up for their appearance here at the Barn next year (look out for dates). The Frampton Shanty Men were welcomed back this year and rousingly proving the point that you don't have to be sat along the harbour-side to appreciate the lyrics and harmonies they entertained with.

Winterbourne Morris Dancers once again put on their wonderful display and were thoroughly

enjoyed by both old and young.



Away from the music the queue for local food producers was starting to build by mid-day and the ice-cream vendor had a steady flow of customers under a cloudless blue sky.

Once again our own Barn Garden had a wonderful display of produce and unsurprisingly sold out during the afternoon.

Winterbourne Mad Hatter Cider makers using the old barn press had a phenomenal day

selling an incredible 95 gallons of cider. You may have watched the demonstration with the apple pulp being wrapped up into 'cheeses' ready to be pressed and make it this look very easy. I can assure you it ain't! After 5 years of practice if the BBC come up with the 'Great British Press Off' Winterbourne Medieval Barn can be proud to field a team that would hold their own with the best from Somerset and Hereford.





Mathew who has worked our cider mill famously for the past 3 years has now retired on his owner's farm in Wickwar. Ian Coward from Awkley stepped into the breach and brought along his Welsh mare Tuppence. She is still on a learning curve as far as working the cider mill is concerned and put on a lovely exhibition of log pulling for us which is actually her specialist subject!

Ferret Racing: what can you say! Terry joined us from his Exmoor home and was first to arrive at 7am fresh from entertaining the crowds at Widdicombe Fair which you may have seen on BBC's Countryfile on Sunday 9th October.

A lady admiring the geese congratulated us on putting on such a lovely show and commented 'the effort to pen the geese (around the pond) looks wonderful – I think you should leave it as a permanent fixture'. 'You're right' I said 'perhaps we will'. Again thank you to one and all who made this event happen, volunteers, traders and entertainers and everyone who came along.

View from the Chair

Dear Members and Friends

It seems hard to believe that we are nearly at the end of another year. 2016 has been notable in many ways. We have had an extremely successful Events programme with 'Carols in the Barn' still to come on 10 & 11 December. In addition to the normal events like the Medieval Fayre, Opera and Shakespeare, we have held new events such as the "Wind in the Willows" and "A Day's Work". The recent Orchard Harvest Day has probably been the best ever with over a thousand people enjoying the day. I would like to thank the Events Group for their hard work in developing the events as well as all the Volunteers who have helped to make them a success.

The programme for 2017 is currently being developed, and details will be made available as soon as they are available. I hope that you are finding the monthly Newsletters helpful and informative. As I am sure you appreciate there is a lot going on at the moment, and the Newsletter provides a means of keeping you up to date with developments as they occur.

The other major development has been the HLF Development Grant. We have a number of Consultants already on board, and details have been included in the Newsletters.

Arrangements are currently in hand for the remaining members of the design team, including Architects and Interpretation Consultants. The next steps are to develop the detailed proposals for refurbishment in conjunction with development of detailed Activity Plans for the future. Obviously we would be delighted to hear from any of you who have ideas for potential future activities. Work is also in hand on the acquisition of the £400K Match Funding required.

As ever, we are always delighted to welcome new volunteers. Volunteering will give you an opportunity to meet new people as well as helping the Trust and the wider Community. Please contact me if you wish to get involved either for the first time, or to change focus onto a different area of interest. We are very flexible both in terms of the time that you may have available to give us, and the commitments that you are able or willing to undertake. We can also offer a wide range of potential activities. You can get involved as much or as little as you want; and all contributions, whether great or small, are both important and valued. Volunteers have the opportunity to help to shape the future of this magnificent building at a crucial point in its history.

We have also made progress on site refurbishment projects. We obtained a Premises Licence to facilitate future events and there was a condition that fencing be provided around the pond and soakaway. The Planning and Listed Building Consent for refurbishment of the Cart Shed as an Education Centre has been granted and work is in hand to secure the remaining funding required. Similarly we have received Listed Building Consent to provide doors to the Cow Byres to provide secure areas.

A Day's Work – 18 September 2016

This performance, variously described as a 'folk opera' or a 'musical drama', told the story of a group of farm workers, who were also members of their village mummers, and what happened when the young men were called up to serve in The Great War. The title comes

from a remark made in 1794 by a dying soldier to his commander the Duke of Wellington, who was visibly moved to see him terribly wounded; "It's all right sir; it's all in a day's work."

The powerful songs, written by Mick Ryan, were sung by Mick Ryan, Paul Downes, Pete Morton, Heather Bradford, Greg Russell and Matt Quinn, and the story carried everyone along with it due to the very convincing performances of the cast. They are all top performers in the



folk world, and their talent was evident throughout. Matt, Pete and Greg even managed to do a broom dance in the confines of the not very big stage! The theme of the mummers play, when the dead man is brought back to life by a magic potion administered by the doctor, is cleverly contrasted with the real death and destruction of WWI, when no magic potions could redeem the awfulness.



In this case the death was not on the battlefield; the young conscientious objector, forced to fight against his principles, met his death at the hands of a firing squad. Man's inhumanity to man was not just between enemies, but was all too evident between the high-ups and the ordinary Tommies of the British army. Greg Russell gave a very poignant

and wholly convincing performance as the young conshie. His talent was recognised when, in a duo with Ciaran Algar (who normally performs in A Day's Work but was unavailable this time), he won the Radio 2 Young Folk Award in 2013 and the following year the Radio 2 Horizon Award. I was certainly in need of the Kleenex by the end of the show and I don't think I was the only one. Seeing the show in an agricultural setting just heightened the poignancy. It was a shame that only 50 people turned up to see this wonderful show; I would certainly see it again and again if I get the chance.

Heritage Open Days at Winterbourne Church and Barn 10 & 11 September 2016

Visitors to Winterbourne Church and the adjacent medieval Barn enjoyed a feast of bell ringing during Heritage Open Days weekend, as well as exploring the history and architecture of the two buildings.

In St Michael's church, CCTV cameras were installed so that visitors could simultaneously watch the ringers in action in the ringing room and the bells themselves up above. The Barn was host to the Lichfield Diocesan Mobile Belfry (LDMB), a set a small bells (80 pound tenor), which arrived on a trailer and was set up in the middle of the Barn. Phil Gay, one of the Trustees of the LDMB charity, transported the bells from Crewe and also supervised the assembly of the belfry by an enthusiastic group of ringers. Ringers from local towers




were on hand all weekend to demonstrate ringing on both sets of bells, to give visitors the opportunity to have a go, and to talk about what a wonderful hobby we have.

Non-ringing visitors were fascinated to watch the bells rotating in response to the ringers pulling on the ropes below, quite unlike the popular perception of monks flying up and down on the ends of the ropes! And after the visitors had left on the Saturday, the ringers

continued to enjoy a social evening. They rang the bells, both in the tower and the LDMB, had a good chat and tucked into a fish and chip supper from the local chippie in Winterbourne. Ringing is really a very sociable occupation!

The weather on Sunday was better and this seemed to attract more visitors. There were several lapsed ringers who had a go and admitted that they could get drawn back into ringing again, plus a number of non-ringers who

West Gallery Workshop – 16 June 2016

This was the second workshop run for us by the Bristol Harmony West Gallery Quire. For those who haven't come across it before, West Gallery music is the style of church music common in the 18th and early 19th centuries, performed in four-part harmony by the village choir and the village band. They were usually stationed at the back of the church, either on raised pews set in tiers like theatre seats, or more often from the west gallery which has given its name to this type of music. The congregation would turn to face them during the singing, hence 'facing the music'. There is a very lively West Gallery Music Association, website www.wgma.org.uk, and numerous quires (that is how they spell it!) around the country.

Assorted singers and musicians assembled at 10am on 16 July, some coming from as far afield as Exeter and Carmarthen, and a mixture of experienced West Gallery singers and complete novices. Altogether we had 27 participants plus quite a few members of Bristol Harmony to help us along. We had flutes, fiddles, clarinets, a bassoon, a concertina and a double bass, a



pretty typical mixture of the instruments which would have been used at the time, although cellos were more common than double basses and concertinas weren't invented until rather later.

Esther Steward led the day and her expertise and infectious enthusiasm ensured that we both learnt a lot and had a wonderful time. After lunch she assembled us outside the barn for some singing in the fresh air before we went back inside for the afternoon session.



We had a fabulous day, everyone enjoyed themselves hugely and we have all agreed that this will become a regular fixture in the barn's calendar of events. Next year's date has already been agreed, so put Saturday 22 July in your diaries and come along and join us. Apple Grafting Workshop Saturday 25th February 2017 10am-4pm

This apple grafting workshop, run for the first time last year, will be run again this year. The course will explain why we graft, how it works and illustrate some of the techniques involved. It will then involve individual hands on work in learning to cut the wood in the correct way

and preparing the cut wood for grafting. Then comes the key moment that of making your own graft from start to finish, ending up with a new apple tree. There will be the opportunity to make at least three grafts, there may be additional root stocks on which to make further grafts at a small cost.

The workshop will again be run by Ben Raskin of the Soil Association who is highly

experienced in fruit growing and from personal experience is an excellent tutor. The photo shows an apple grafted after learning the technique from him on a similar course.

Once you have learnt to graft you will have the whole world of varieties available to you to be able to grow yourself.

We will provide some common varieties for grafting. If you have a favourite that you wish to propagate then bring your own wood to graft. If you know of a particular variety that you wish to propagate, but do not have wood,



please let us know and we will attempt to procure some wood (£1 extra on the day). The only equipment you will need will be a very sharp knife, e.g. a Stanley Knife.

This course would make a very suitable present. Cost £35 in advance plus £7.50 on the day for materials. The workshop is limited to 8. If demand is sufficient, it may be repeated the following weekend. To book, please download the booking form from the website, complete and return as indicated.
